

## HOME RULE IN COMMITTEE.

## THE LAST ELEVEN CLAUSES OF THE IRISH BILL PUT THROUGH

The Postponed Financial Clauses All That Now Remain, and by Next Thursday They Must Be Disposed Of—Majorities On Many Clauses Small.

LONDON, July 21.—The last 11 clauses of the Home Rule bill were brought through the committee stage last evening.

On Tuesday evening of last week the work of the House in committee had gone forward to clause 27.

This clause, which provides for other persons having salaries charged on the consolidated fund was carried on Monday.

Clause 28, concerning persons in the Civil Service, clauses 29, concerning pensions, was passed last evening.

Ten o'clock this evening was the time fixed in the Government schedule for closing the debate on the other eleven clauses. At that hour the committee was discussing clause 29, which provides that the bill, providing that relating to the Royal Statuary, be repealed at the end of six years and that none but civil police be created under an Irish act.

This amendment concerned clause 30, which creates the Irish Royal Constabulary and Dublin Guard.

The debate was cut short at the clock struck, and under the closure the amendment was carried by a vote, 357 to 49.

Clauses 50-56 were then passed in rapid succession by a majority varying between 24 and 30. The subject of these clauses are: Police, Irish exchequer, law applicable to both houses of the Irish Legislature, supplemental provisions as to the powers of the Irish Legislature, limitation of borrowing by local authorities, temporary restrictions on powers of the Irish Legislature with regard to land and statutory provisions.

Clause 37—Concerning the continuance of existing laws, courts, officers, etc., was carried without division.

Concerning the appointed day for the purpose of the bill was carried by a vote of 295 to 261.

Clause 29, containing the significance of terms used in the bill, was lost.

Clause 40, concerning the title of the act, was carried without division. The committee rose.

There was total lack of excitement throughout the evening. The next work in committee will be the consideration of the postponed financial clauses 14, 15 and 16 of the new Government's schedule and the preamble. The debate on these subjects, according to the Government program, will be cleared one week from to-night.

THE ENGLISH MINERS.

Will Call Out All Who Have Not Been Notified of a Reduction.

LONDON, July 21.—The Miners Federation continued its conference at Birmingham yesterday. It was decided to call out all the men who have not received notice of reduction. These men will therefore be idle until the miners' strike of July 25, or the general notice of when they will be allowed to return to work.

The representatives of 149,000 miners voted in favor of the resolution to call out those members of the Federation who have suffered a reduction in their wages. Delegates representing 100,000 men voted against the resolution. It is provided that the miners in question shall not give notice to their masters of the termination of their contracts on the next "making up" day.

THE BRAZIL INSURRECTION.

The Royal Admiral Fired in Santa Cruz Fortress.

LONDON, July 21.—A despatch from Montevideo says that the conflict in Rio Grande do Sul has become a series of small and isolated encounters between the regular forces of revolutionaries and Government troops.

A despatch from Rio Janeiro says that the captured rebel ship Jupiter with Admiral Wandekolk on board has been brought into port. Wandekolk, who deserted the Government naval service to join the rebels, has been shot up in Santa Cruz fortress.
