Powderly to Leave the K. of I., NEW YORK, July 25 .- The Sun to-morrow will say : it was declared on good authority last evening that T. V. Powderly is going to resign as General Master Workman when the general convention of the Knights is held in October. The order is in a bad way, and the per capita tax would not be enough to pay the salaries of the officers if there was no money in the treasury. Powderly has been studying law for some time and is in a position to begin practice in the Penna courts. All that delays him now is his duty as General Master Workman. The Knights will not ask him to retire. It is believed that T. B. McGuire will be Powderley's successor. The salary is nominally \$5,000 but Powderley would not accept more than \$3,500. The salary will probably be cut down after Powderly

They Won't Take Silver.

CRICAGO, July 25 .- A notice was posted to day in the United States sub-treasury to the effect that silver would not be recrived. During the day many employees of banks brought in sacks of the white metal to get currency in exchange, but they had to shoulder their loads and go again as they came. "We are unable to sandle the big amount of silver we have on hand," said one of the officials, "until it can be all counted and checked up we will not receive any more over the counter. For some time past great quantities of silver have been brought here by the banks to be exchanged for carrency until the amount has become greater than we can handle, and we have had to call a temporary halt. VALETTA, Malta, July 25 .- The court martial investigating into the loss of the battle ship Victoria resumed its sittings this morning. Rear-Admiral Markham was recalled.
