

A POISONING CASE.

A Manitoha Farmer Dies From the Effeets of Strychnine-A Young English Lad Arrested Charged with the prime, Winnerpo, July 27. -Two weeks ago a farmer living mear Virden named Alfred Oceares died audderly under suspicious circumstances. The body was buried, but was shortly afterwards exhumed on the coroner's order and an autopsy held. The post mortem went to show that Greaves had come to his death by strychnine poisoning and a vertilet to this effect was returned by the jury. Detectives were set to work, and on Monday Philip Hill, a young English lad of 14, was placed under arrest. Hill came from one of the Hornes and had been employed by Greaves for some time. Yesterday Hill was arraigned before a magistrate on a charge of deliberately murdering Greaves and he was committed for trial. It is said that the resecution will show conclusively that the boy put strychnine in the porridge his employer, had for breakfast, and that his motive for sacking to encompass his master's death was robbery.

San Francisco, July 27 .- Advices from Panania give an account of buried treasure amounting to \$1,750,000 which is now being searched for near La Plata, in Argentine. When the civil war broke out in Chile, Prosident Balmaceda, realizing the importance of a navy in such a conflict, commissioned Colonel Pinto to proceed to England and purchase a couple of fast cruisers to be sent to Valparaiso in haste.
