Siam Gives Guarantees. Panis, Aug. 2 .- Prince Vadhana, the Siamese Minister to France, called at the Foreign Office to-day and informed Foreign Minister Develle that Siam was prepared to give the supplementary guarantees required by France for the strict fulfilment of the terms of the ultimatum, pending a final settlement of the questions involved. It is understood, that the French will occupy the river and port of Chantiboon, which town lies 175 miles to the south-east of Bangkok, on the Gulf of Siam, until a complete evacuation is made of Siamese military posts on the left bank of the Mekong river. What is Required. Panis, Aug. 2. The supplementary guarantees demanded by France from Siam were contained in a note issued by M. Deville yesterday and made public to day. Following is text of the note: The delay of Siam in accepting the ultimatum presented by the French Minister resident at Bangkok has justified the Government of the Republic in imposing heavier conditions. Being desirous, however, to give further proof of the sentiments of moderation by which she has been constantly actuated France will content herself, as an indispensable guarantee for the practical execu-

tion of the clauses of the ultimatum, with occupying the river and port of Chantiboon until the complete evacuation of the posts established by the Siamese on the left bank of the Mekong river Further, for the purpose of guaranteeing a continuance of the good relations happily re-established between France and Siain, and for preventing a conflict in the region

of Lake Toulesap, Siam will undertake to maintain no military forces in Battambang and Siemreuf and the locality situated within a radius of twenty-five kilometres of the Mekong, starting from the Cambodian frontier. Never can it be justified as a collective arm of aggression, hian has a natural right to live and to work. As a means ofprocuring a living he has a right to remove every obstacle to his work and to get the value of his labor. And, therefore, when his labor is neither productive nor remunerative he has a right to refuse to continne it. But an individual right cannot be tranformed into a collective right, nor can an arm of decence be changed into an arm of aggression to cause a means of good to degenerate into a source of harm. An aggressive strike is not reciprocal between operative and operative, but an instrument of attack upon proprietor and property. The operative on strike is a passive and dominative instrument, not an intelligent and free being. While his action lessens the capital of his employer, it puts no money into his own pocket. The right of protecting the operative,

whether in the factory or in the field should be admitted, and for this purpose the maximum of labor, as well as the minimum of salary, should be fixed. The hours of labor should be arranged, giving due attention to days of rest and abstention for labor.
