INCENSED ITALIANS.

Trying to Force Their Government Demand Redress.

Algues Mortes, France, are increasing and threaten to involve grave international complications. It is not in Rome alone that the popular indignation at what Italians consider a gross breach of international comity is finding verit in demonstrations that are evidently intended to coorce the Government into demanding an apology from France for the attack upon Italians, and the payment of an indemnity Riots directed against the French have occurred in many of the provincial towns and the situation is considered exceedingly grave. The most serious outbreak of popular feeling against the French occurred when a howing mob attempted to burn the French embassy here. Some of the rioters carried cans of petroleum. The authorities had anticipated that an attack might be attempted on the embassy, and a strong force of troops was detailed to guard the building. The rioters, however, attempted to carry out the threats to burn the embassy, notwithstanding the presence of the soldiers. They refused to disperse and the soldiers charged upon them several times, wounding many with their sabres. Forty five of the rioters were arrested. The rioting in the provincial towns was only

quelled by the use of troops. More Anti-French Demonstrations. Roug, Aug. 22.—Some 500 workingmen. tried to start an anti-French riot late yesterday afternoon, but were charged and dispersed by the police. Several were wounded and many arrested.
