
DECORATIVE WORK

A Border For a Toucloth, Ribbon Plaiting, Embroidery on Checked Lines, Etc. Leaves of various forms play some considerable part in the decoration of fancy articles this season. A pretty border for a teacloth represents chestnut leaves arranged so that they slightly overlap. The leaves are worked so that every alternate one is an excellent insitation of a skeleton leaf, and as the linen is cut away beyond the edges of the pattern the segments of the leaves make a pretty finish of scallops all round the cloth. Ivy leaves out out of dark green plush, apparently lined with silk of a paler shade and mounted over cardboard. are being made up into mats and letter or

Dainty table mats are composed of a piece of very fine matting, which is laid in the center of an oblong of coarse linen rather larger than the matting. The edges of the linen are so arranged as to fold over to the right side of the mat and are traced for embroidery. The linen is fastened at the corners with a finy button and loop, so that it can be readily removed from the matting when solled. Cardboard boxes can be covered with in-

terplaited ribbon of two colors and turned to all kinds of uses. It takes some little time to learn to plait the ribbon closely and firmly. Start with a straight horizontal piece pinned to a board, and all the perpendicular ribbons fastened to that, and then the rest is quite easy. It is an art soon ac-
