

The Iona's Close Call.

The steam barge Iona, J. D. Van-Alstyne, master and owner, left Trenton Monday evening with lumber and passengers for Oswego. As she ran into the lake she caught the wind from the east, and about 3 a.m., Tuesday when between the Galloups and Duck Islands, the storm struck her with great fury. The yawl was carried away, and at about 7 a.m. the deck load, consisting of 400,-000 pickets and 50,000 feet of lumber was washed overboard.

The wind jammed the barge down into Nine Mile Bay. She kept drifting towards the shore until she was within five hundred feet of the breakers. The passengers got ready to save themselves and for a time it seemed as though all hope of saving their lives lay in floating ashore on the lumber which constituted the cargo.
