CINCINNATI, O., Sept. 4.-What will prove perhaps the most disastrous street car accident ever recorded, took place in this city last evening at seven o'clock. An electric car dashed down a hill at frightful speed, left the track, broke a telegraph pole and shot into a saloon, wreck ing both itself and the structure it struck. As a result of the collision two people are dead, six are fujured beyond recovery and nearly forty more are burt, many of them

Six patrol wagons were upon the scene with a few minutes, and the dead and dying were quickly transferred to the city hospital, where the entire medical corps was soon busily engaged in rendering such assistance as was in its power.
