LONDON, Sept. 5. - The Marquis of salisbury plans to make the decisive division on the Home Role Bill in the House of Lords the occasion of a great Tory rally. Not content with the normal majority of the Lords against the Government, he will insist that every Tory peer that can be reached by the whip shall be present to record his opposition to the Hadstonian policy. At his instance the Tory whips have sent exceptionally urgent notices to all members of their party in the Upper House,

The prospect is that, despite the unfavstrength of the opposition will be brought out for the vote. Most of the peers who usually bolt all parliamentary duties at this time of year are showing obedience to the party whips which they never evinced before, and dozens are preparing to leave the race-courses, the moor, and the summer resorts of the continent to join ismonstration against Home Rule. Regarded With Disfavor. LONDON, Sept. 5 .- Not all Unionists rallying an overwhelming majority of the Lords to vote against the bill. Such a course, they feel, must direct general attention to the broadening chasm between the Lords and the Commons and tend to precipitate the fight of the British

democracy against the Upper House. For many years the British people have watched with increasing jealousy the interference of the peers with the work of the popular representatives of the lower house. The assembling of the aristocrats to defeat a measure approved by the Commons after the most exhaustive debate in parliamentary history will not only aggravate this jealousy, but will also excite more interest in the passage of the bill than has been felt before in the United Kingdom. There is no doubt that the great mass of Liberal voters in Great Britain have felt only lukewarm favor towards Home Rule. They have supported the policy more for the sake of Mr. Gladatone than from any deep conviction.

Upon this meed, however, the course of Tory and Liberal-Unionist Lords is likely to react in a way not desired by

The Labouchere Radicals prophesy that their demonstrative rejection of the Home Rule Bill may be the final act of their suicidal folly.

Chamberlain, who spoke first, committed-himself absolutely to make no opposition to closure on principle, but Bal four, who spoke late in the debate, con tented himself with a non-committal line He saw the advantage of leaving his own hands free to imitate Giadstone's measures when he comes into office, whereas Chamberlain must turn another somersault to support any such measure,

Chamberlain complained to the Tory whips that Balfour had played him false, but Balfour replied that as Chamberlain did not consult him about the line he was going to take, he did not consult Changberlain about his line. It is not unlikely that Balfour closed Cnamberlain's eyes

The Tories are getting restive at Chamberlain assuming the lead of their party as well as his own. They are delighted at the snub administered to him. As Chamberlain is so much swayed by personal reelings, and as he has never been known to let an account stand with the balance against him, everyone is waiting to see just how he will get even.

CHANGE IN BANKING LAWS. United States National Banks to be Re-

organized as State Institutions. New York, Sept. 5 .- A Washington special to the Sun says: It has been ascertained that, besides Speaker Crisp, Secretary Carlisle and the members of the House Committee on Banking and Currency, Hale, of Missouri, and Warner, of New York, President Cleveland took part in the conference at the treasury department. Secretary Carlisle was requested to draw up a bill changing the banking laws. The bill, it is said, will provide for the re organization of the national banks as State institutions, and for the repeal of the 10 per cent. tax, so as to permit them to issue currency the same as national banks now do. The currency will be based upon state municipal and other bonds or private securities of such a character as to meet the approval of the Government

authorities The present system of examination by the United States is to be continued and the Government is to stand good for the redemption of the currency in gold. Such state banks as now exist will be permitted to issue currency provided they comply with the requirements of the new law, but against such banks as do not re-organize in compliance with the law, the 10 per cent, tax will still stand. That feature of the present law which provides that banks may issue currency only to the amount of 90 per cent of their bonds will probably be retained, as it is expected that the extension of the privilege to the many state institutions which would take advantage of it would sufficiently increase the volume of surrency. It would thereafter naturally

Coughlin's New Trial. CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 5.-Within a few days the last scene wifl be played in the colebrated case of the murder of Dr. Cronin, Daniel Coughlin, the ex-detective and the last survivor of those who were sentenced to imprisonment for life for the murder at Lakeview on May 4, 1889, will appear in court shortly for a

On January 19, 1893, the Illinois Sp preme Court reversed the finding of the lower courts and granted Coughlin a chance for liberty on the ground that the jury which heard his case was prejudiced from Chicago to places unknown. Few of the old lawyers have been remined. The friends of the accused allege that much new avidence will be introduced, and hint that some of it will implicate people in Chicago whose names thus far have not been associated with this famous case. The impression prevails here that Conghlinwill be acquitted at his second trial and set at liberty.

The World's S. S. Workers.
