MONTREAL Sept. 6 .- At the afternoon session of the Labor Congress resterday the Committee on Credentials reported delegates qualified from Quebec, Montreal, Sillery, Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa, Prescott, Hull, Cornwall and St. Catharines. President George T. Beales, Toronto, then delivered his annual address. After 'congratulating Congress on the strides made abroad, particularly in England, towards reforms necessary to the happiness and contensment of a people, he regretted that but small progress had been made in Canada towards the same end. Latest News of Peary. St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 6. - Lieut, Peary's arctic steamer Falcon arrived here last night. She left Peary and his party all well at the head of Bowdoin Bay, north of Greenland, in August. Peary had at that time eighty dogs, twenty tons of walrus meat and eleven deer on hand. One incident of this expedition will be the birth of a child. Late in September Mrs. eary is expected to become a mother. The infant will be the first white child born in this latitude. In fact it will be born further north than the habitation of any human being of the present day.

Canada's Criminal Record. OTTAWA, Sept. 6 .- The criminal statistics for the year ending Sept. 30, 1892, have been issued by the Department of Agriculture. Allowing for an increase i population and the volume shows an extremely slight increase in crime in Canada as compared with the previous year. The number of persons convicted of indictable offences last year was 4,030, or 8,23 per every 10,000 inhabitants. Of the 4,030 there were 1,740 intemperate and 2,158 used liquor moderately.
