WAR IN BRAZIL. The Navy of the Republic Seizes Against President. VALPARAISO, Chile, via Galveston, Tex., Sept. 7.—The Herald's correspondent in Montevideo telegraphs that the officers of the naval force now at Rio Janeiro, Brazil, intended to force President Francisco to resign.

Result of a Head-on Collision on the Panhandle Road. CARS GROUND TO FRAGMENTS. Weak Train From Medical Aid—Terribly Distressing Series of Suffering—Cause of the Accident Has Not as Yet Been Ascertained.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—A head-on collision between a milk train on the Chicago, Pittsburg and Fort Wayne railway and an east-bound freight train on the Eastern, Chicago and Pittsburg, Chicago and St. Louis railway killed 12 persons and injured many more yesterday.

The dead are—Anton Temple, manager of the Schiller theatre, Chicago, unknown man with Manager Temple, probably an actor, William Rigney, travelling passenger agent of the Wisconsin Central railway; G. A. Hines, Vinson, Ind.; William Johnson, New Albany, Ind.; William Richards, Chicago; R. D. Adams, Fairfield, Ill.; E. A. Bernard, Terre Haute, Ind.; four unknown men.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.—News has been received from Honduras that the patriots of Bonilla recently attempted to blow up a freight powder house in Tegucigalpa with dynamite. The explosion prevented a frightful loss of life. Twenty-eight dynamite bombs were thrown at the powder-house, and in the explosion five of the patriots were fatally and six were injured shortly afterwards. The building was demolished.
