Result of a Head-On Collision on the Panhandle Road.

CARS GROUND TO FRAGMENTS

Wreck Distant From Medical Aid - Ter ribly Distressing Scenes of Suffering - Cause of the Accident Has Not as Yet Been Ascertained.

CHICAGO, Sept. 8.-A head-on collision between a milk train on the Chicago, Pitta burg and Fort Wayne railway and an eastbound passenger train on the Panhandle, or Pittsburg, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis railway killed 12 persons and injured many more yesterday. The collision occurred on the "L," running from the main line just south of Colebouse to East Hammond, Ind., at the point of a curve, and in a sparsely settled locality. The baggage car of the castbound passenger train was ground into pieces, and from this most of the killed and injured were taken. The distance of the scene of the wreck from immediate police and surgical aid made the calamity a most distressing one; and it was more than a hour before most of those rescued maimed and bleeding could be carried to houses in Colehouse and South Chicago for treatment, Physicians were summoned from the latter place and engines were hastily prepared and rushed to the scene of the

Even if this course could have had no fruitful result, it was a clear and patriotic line of action for the House of Lords to take. He was no enthusiast for Home Rule. He snpported it simply as the best of the three courses open to the Opposition-to adopt
