Sceretary F. B. Sanborn presided. An address was delivered on "The Poor People of India," by the Suami Vive Kananda of Madras, a Brahmin priest. He drew a vivid picture of the manners and customs, modes of living and destitution of the 200,000,000 people of Hindoostan and farther India. The department report on the swesting system was read by the chairman and it bristled with statistics of the evils of the tenement house work shops, against which the society has labored so long and effectively.
