BURNED TO THE WATER. THREE LIVES SACRIFICED BY FIRE ON A STEAMER.

LEAMINGTON, Sept. 18.—The steamer Byron Terrier, which plies between Rochester harbor and Cleveland, was burned at the Leamington dock, this morning, at two o'clock.

The fire was caused by the explosion of a lamp which was on the forward part of the vessel.

The fire had gained such headway before being discovered, and was burning so rapidly that those of the crew who escaped did so only with their lives.

Two of the crew, George Shaw, from, of Wallbridge, and John Crunk, deckhand, of Dresden, perished, being entangled by the smoke before aware of their danger.
