A Later Despatch. NAPANEE, Sept. 14 .- This morning about two o'clock, Angus McLeod, merchant and tinsmith, was awakened by burglars in his house. He arose and advanced towards the burgiar, who told him not to take another step or he would shoot him. At the same time he fired a warning shot in the opposite direction. McLeod reached for a water pitcher and threw it at the burglar, who, in exchange, fired a shot, taking effect in Mc-Leod's neck, which severed the main artery. He died almost instantly without saying a word. The murderer escaped with about \$20, proceeds of a social held in the Presbyterian church last night, leaving his hat behind.

The News In Kingston. The Wing bulletined the tidings of the murder in Napanee at an early hour this morning, and the news spread with rapidity. The McLeods were residents of this city for many years, coming here from Scotland in the forties. Mr. McLeod, father of Angus, was a sailor, and during a gale his vessel was wrecked, and he was lost. His wife and family of three boys were left. Angus, was the aldest, and learned his trade as insmith with Edwin Chown. After becoming a journeyman he went to Napanee. His brothers, David and ohn, went to Hamilton. The family lived on Princess atreet, almost opposite the residence of George Newlands. About twenty years ago Angus removed to Napauce. He was a genial person and was continually asking about old friends in the limestone city. He lived one in a brick house on Bridge street, a comfortable place, and in one of the best secbusiness section. He was highly esteem-

ed by all classes of the community. Mr McLeod was married to a daughter of the late Charles Paisley, who erected the hotel known as the Paisley house, Napance. She has a brother there, John Paisley, grocer, and a sister, Mrs. Coxall. The wife was greatly shocked by the awful killing of her husband-Chief Horsey was well acquainted with the deceased and worked at the bench with him in Edwin Chown's. The chief knew Mr McLeod to be one of the best

liked men in the place. He always gave satisfaction to his employer and with the workmen he was a favorite. Mr. Mo-Leod was a very genial person and had a host of friends in Kingston. Miss Bryant and Mrs. Berry were intimate with the McLeod family. They

say Angus when a young man was a great favorite. The family was highly espected while they lived here. W. McCammon, market clerk, went to school with Angus McLeod and speaks of him as an exemplary young man.

Mrs. McLeod, sr., mother of the unfortunate man, annually visited friends in Kingston.

Seen By Mr. Elllott. It was after two o'clock when the burglar was seen by G. M. Elliott, collector of gustoms, passing his house (next door to that of McLeod). He had been awakened by the shooting and on walking past. When he got away from the houses he ran as fast as he could. It is not supposed that the burglar intended to shoot Mr. McLeod, but merely

wanted to frighten him until he got Mrs. McLeod saw the burglar going out of a back window but being hysterical she was not able to give a description of the man. Owing to the darkness Mr. Elliott could not see the man sufficiently distanct to describe him particu-
