The first year he drove the Indians out of the St. Croix Valley, and suggested to the Northwestern railway that it would be a good idea to build to far St. Paul as soon as the company could get a grant which would pay them two or three times the cost of construction. The fol lowing year he adopted trousers, and made \$175 from the sale of wolfe scalps. He also cleared twenty-seven acres of troit; J. A. Delpher, Albany, N. Y.; E land and raised some watermelons. In Lyons, Windsor. 1854 he established and endowed a district school in Pleasant Valley. It was at this time that he began to turn his attention to the abolition of slavery in the
