Up by Bandits.

An incident That Will Tend to Make the Profession Unpopular-To Arm All Trainmen With Bepeating Shotguns Loaded With Buckshot

St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 26 -Officials of the Kansas, St. Jos and Council Bluffs railroad foiled an attempt to rob one of its passenger trains, killed two of the handits, and captured three others at Francis, one and a half miles from this city, last night. The dead are:-Edward Kohler and Hugo Indall. The names of those asptured are Frederick. Herch and Harvey. Train No. 3 left Kansas City at 9.05 Sun day night and arrived here at 13.30 Mor day morning. The officials of the railroad had been notified that the robbery of the road had been planned and the notified the police -

When the train arrived here w Jumin's train was made up, and sixteen police officers, under the command of the chief of police, were put aboard. In order to thoroughly deceive the robbers the train was made an exact duplicate of train No. 3 When the dummy reached a point two miles north of St. Joseph the engineer's attention was arrested by a lighted lantern moving two and fro between the rails. He obeyed the signal, and six masked men surrounded the engine. One of the six mounted the engine, and presenting one revolver at the engineer's head and an other at the firemen's, held them in subection while the other five men hastened to rob the express car. They ordered the messenger to open the door, which he did forthwith. Three of the bandits at ones entered the car, leaving two outside to

keep guard. The policemen who were guarding the train were distributed in the various cars. the majority of them being concealed in the express car. Immediately the three bandits who had undertaken the work of robbing the car entered the door the police ordered them to surrender. The robbers vere taken completely by surprise, bu they opened fire at once upon the police. The police returned the fire and a gene

ral fusitade followed, about 25 shots being fired on both sides. When the smoke cleared away the lifeless bodies of Kohler and Indail were found lying on the floor of the car. Both had been shot through the head. Frederick, the third robber engaged in the fight in the car, was uninjured, and was placed under arrest. None of the officers were injured. The two robbers who had been left outside to keep watch were placed under arrest. The bandit who had been detailed

Anarchists Plan to Destroy Dominion Parliament Buildings.

CALAMITY, Pa., Sept. 26 .- While Au gust Reese, a French-Canadian miner, and his wife were returning home from a visit to a neighbor's house last evening they were set upon by a party of French-Canadian miners and shot dead. Noel Marson was captured, but August

There are two societies among the foreigners, the one open and avowed anarchists, and the other having nothing to do with anarchy. Marson and Brice are leaders among the former. In some way Mrs. Reece became acquainted with the loings of the Anarchists and Marson and Brice were chosen to kill her.

It is said this society had a plot to blow up Canadian Government buildings. Constable Mahaffy is authority for this statement. He said: "The murder is the indirect outcome of the killing of a Frenchman about a year ago. Then Mrs. Reese learned some of the secrets of the Anarchists, and gave away the information that Marson and Brice were going to Canada on Monday. They had plans all laid out to blow up some of the Canadian Government buildings.

World's Parliament of Religious Will Soor Adjourn-Proceedings Yesterday. CHICAGO, Sept. 26 .- The World's Parliament of Religions is drawing to a close, and but two days more remain of the most remarkable gathering of its kind in the history of Christendom. Quite a number of speakers, however, yet remain to be heard, and as a result the programme has been extended and interest in the event will be maintained to the very last session. When the Parliament assembled yesterday Miss Susan B. Anthony, Rev. Dr. Francis E. Clark, of Boston, founder of the Chris tian Endeavor movement, Prof. Philip Schoff, of the Union Theological Seminary New York, and Virehand Ganghi, of Bombay, were among those occupying seats on the platform. After the usual devotional

exercises L. J. Block, of this city, read a poem upon the friendship of the faiths. Taking as his subject "The relation between the Anglican Church and the Church New York, delivered an address that bore evidences of deep research. Then a representative of the Orient in the person of Rev. George L. Catlin, of Tien-Tsin, China, was presented. He spoke briefly on Christian union and the work of missions. Prof. Schaff, who was given a hearty welcome, delivered an address upon 'The Rennion of Christendom," and Rev. D. L. Whitman, president of Colby Uniresity, briefly touched the subject of Inter denominational Comity." In the scientific section of the Congress addresses upon Shintoism were made by the Right Rev. Reuchi Shibata, head of the Jikko sect, and Rev. Takayoshi Matsuggama.
