

HOW DID MRS. HOOPER DIE?

Further Suspicious Circumstances Connected With the Case Reported Yesterday-Another Woman in the Case - Inquest Commenced.

PORT HOPE, Sept. 30 .- What is rov called the Hooper poisoning case has developed into the greatest sensation which has ever aroused the attention of the putic in this town. Mr. John R. Hooper, husband of the unfortunate woman, is well known here. He was married to Georgina Malo at St. Ambrose de Kildare in 1883. He is employed in the post office department. It is said that Mrs. Hooper's reason. failed of late, and Mr. Hooper endeavored to place her in an insane asylum, but did not succeed. He then set out with Mrs. Hooper, presumably for Montreal. While on the journey she apparently took ill and died at Terrebonne, P.Q. Her symptoms were such that a suspicion of poison was entertained and an investigation was

Detective Carpenter, of Montreal, charges that Hooper at the time his wife died on the train went under an assumed name and told the conductor he was employed by the Government in looking after crazy people. The woman was in the baggage car when taken ill, and her companion says she was subject to fits and preferred to ride in that way. The conductor of the train thought the symptoms like poison. The body in the meantime was forwarded to Toronto and then sent to Port Hope where the corpse was met by Mr. Hooper, and in accordance with his instructions the body

lowing particulars: Edward Neville, grave digger of the cemetery, stated that the burial of Mrs. Hooper took place on Thursday about 10 o'clock, the busband and two or three of his friends only were present. He said it was not necessary for a burial or doctor's certificate to bury persons in that cemetery. In the case of the Hooper burisl no certificate of death or for burial was presented and he did not ask for either. He further states that there was no religions ceremony of any kind at the grave. Chief Constable Douglas, of Port Hope, telegraphed the circumstances of the burial to Montreal where it was thought that an investigation was being made. "Signed, J. R. Hoopen," The letter which Mr. Hooper referred to did not come to hand yesterday but Hooper himself appeared on the scene. Having hired a rig, he drove to the office of Undertaker George, and instructed an employe to proceed the cemetery, exhume the body of Mrs. Hooper, take it to his rooms and embalm it. The undertaker proceeded to carry out the instructions given him. However, Mr. George, sr., when informed of the expedition his son's clerk had started on concluded under the circumstances that it was not a proper course to pursue, his son being of town. He therefore followed to the cemetery and stopped the operation of exhuming the body. The work had only been half accomplished and the body had not been taken from the ground when Mr. George interfered. He then told the caretaker of the cemetery he would be held responsible for any meddling with the body without the eoroner's authority. Coroner Corbett went to the cemetery and placed a man

Caught Like Rats In a Trup, The Victims Had No Warning of Their Fate-Overwhelmed By an Avalanche of Mud, Ore And Water.

CHYSTAL FALLS, Mich., Sept. 80 .- With a terrific rush the water of the Michigamme River broke through a bed weakened by mining into the Mansfield mine between 9 and 10 o'clock last night, drowning twenty eight men who were at work directly under the cave-in. There were forty-six men in the mine when the accident occurred, but eighteen of them who were working in lower levels, managed to escape. None of the bodies have been recovered, and it is believed it will be necessary to dive right through the channel of the river before they can be secured.

It is believed to have been the worst disaster that ever occurred in the Lake Su When the night shift went on duty it was noticed that more water was coming into the mine than usual, but no alarm was felt by the men at the pumps, as they man aged to keep the drifts free. The miners few minutes after 9 o'clock, there was a loud report and rush of water, and the men felt themselves overwhelmed by an avalanche of mud, ore and water. So fast came the flood that it is doubtful whether the men on the upper levels had time to drop their tools and run for their lives to the old shaft.
