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

"And you are in a condition to point distance which has been actually travelled over between the physical misery and the political depression which marked the early years of the country, and the victory recorded last night is immeasurable. second, the distance between that recorded victory to the final investment of Ireland with full self-governing control over her domestic affairs is not only measurable. but short. It was unanswerably observed during our debate that the recent success has been brought about by change of opinion where opinion has been most hostile, viz , change of opinion in England. Scotch, Irish and Welsh votes were with nearly 129. It has been the signal and favorable change in England that has converted this minority into a majority of 40 for Home Rule. Yet England still exhibits her reduced majority to intercept one of the greatest benefits ever conferred not only upon Ireland but upon her. In this attitude she is alone among all the peoples of the English-speaking raca she has not yet quitted but she is quiting. Yet the last struggle still remains, and like the former struggles it will be great, and it will demand the friendly efforts of all those wherever placed, who, under God, have lifted this great cause out from which there remains but a slight step into the promised land, I cherish the most sanguine hope that the conduct of the Irish nation when their great object has been uttained, will fulfill every reasonable hope cherished by those who have aided and will convert its present enemies

Preparing For A Vigorous Anti-Semitic Franco-Siamese Difficulty Has Been BERLIN, Oct. 2 .- Rector Ahiwardt, the Finally Disposed Of.

TO SIGN A TREATY TO-MORROW

Much Delay Caused by the Imperative Tone Adopted by France's Envoy -Allowed Stam But Forty-Eight Hours to Make a Decision.

BANGKOK, Oct. 2 .- M. Dovilers, the French special envoy to Siam, has presented to the Stamese Government for aceptance the draft of a treaty superseding the convention previously submitted to the Siamese Government by kim. The draft was accompanied by a written au-nouncement that if must be accepted with-out alteration within 48 hours. It is understood that the new treaty does not include any conditions which are in excess of the terms of the original ultimatum sent by France to Siam. M. Devilers threatens that if this treaty is not accepted within the time specified he will leave Bangkok.

It's Not Satisfactory. LONDON, Oct. 2 .- The Times correspondand in Bangkok says : " The draft of the treaty is comparatively satisfactory, and embodies the ultimatum, but the convention attached is entirely unsatisfactory, The latter contains terms exceeding and contrary to the ultimatum, stipulating that Prance shall occupy Chantaboon after the original stipulations shall have been carried out, and until the left bank of the Mekong and the reserved zone shall have been completely evacuated and pacified. Unless France faithfully fulfils the pledges given by M. Devilers Chantaboon will long emain in the possession of the French. The proces verbal accompanying the convention, reiterates that France will evacuate Chantaboon as early as possible under the agreement.
