THE ANSWER DRAWN UP.

To the Appeal of Prof. Campbell Against Decision of Presbytery. MONTREAL, Oct. 3 .- At a special meet ing of the Montreal presbytery the committee to whom it was referred to prepare the reply to Prof. Campbell's reason of appeal against the finding of the presbytery in the case against him recom-

mended the following answer: "The presbytery had before it all the arguments and scriptural references. written and oral, used by Prof. Campbell unable to discover in them any material modification of the views them to do it quickly. occasioned the process against him.
