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

All Communication With the Outside World Cut Off by the Rising Waters - Houses Collapse -Vessels Driven Ashore and Wrecked.

MOSTLE, Ala., Oct. 3 .- A south-east gale broke here yesterday morning about four o'clock and the wind has been increasing in velocity ever since. It is now blowing at least 50 miles an hour. The barometer is still falling. The wind has blown the water in from the gulf until the river has reached Royal street, which is four blocks from the river and at an elevation of about 15 feet from mean river height. There is no possible chance of estimating the money damage. 'All the wholesale and a great portion of the retail district of the city is some four feet under water. 
