FORTY BURNED.

Their Lives in Burning Barracks St. Petersburg, Oct. 6.-The Newsky infantry barracks at Boslavl, Province of Smolensk, were burned last night. The fire was discovered shortly after 10 o'clock, but before the men could be roused the flames had spread through most of the building. About 400 men ran out in their

night clothes. Of these 60 who were driven to the roof were obliged to jump for their lives. Eleven were killed and eight injured so severely that they will die, Twenty-three men and five non-commissioned officers, overcome in the halls or rooms by the smoke and heat, were burned to death. Many other soldiers are missing, but it has been impossible as yet to learn whether their bodies are in the ruins or whether they were merely injured and are being eared for by friends in the town. The fire is believed to have been set by a member of the regiment, as it spread more rapidly than could have been possible under ordinary circumstances.

Bad Water the Cause. Rown, Oct. 6 .- Four hundred cases cholera and 220 deaths were registered in Palermo during the week ending last Tuesday. The director of sanitation reports that the chief cause of the outbreak in Palermo is the bad condition and scanty supply of the water.

Suspected Cholera in Yorkshire. LONDON, Oct. 6 .- The death of five persons in one family within a week in Bradford, Yorkshire, has raised a suspleion that cholera has appeared in that town. In all the cases death was ascribed to cholerine. An investigation is being made to ascertain the truth.
