



It is very expensive and less-beautiful than many wares which do not cost so much, but is interesting for the pictures of Russian life which it exhibits, A handsome blue and white ware receiving attention and much admiration is the Royal Copenhagen. Although its designs are artistic, it is not so dainty as the Sevres.

Gold plated china is the latest fad. While it is very brilliant and finds a ready market with a certain class of people, it is named only as a passing fancy. Limoges dinner sets are very, handsome, They have a white ground, with double bands of dead gold, and between these bands are decorations of gay flowers in Dresden patterns. The handles are of solid dead gold, and the covered dishes are box shaped. These costly goods will of course,

to a certain extent, set the fashion in shape and decoration for more unpretentious wares. They are noted, together with the following, by The Decorator and Furnisher: A new fish set has a ground work of pale rose color which fades at the center of the platter and plates and is almost a blue. Potato Salad Rightly Made and Served. Slice bolled potatoes while hot, and pour over them enough sweet oil to moisten them, and stir it well through. Slice white nions very fine, 1 onion to 6 large potatoes, and mix in. Add a pinch (no more) of sugar and season with sait and vinegar to the taste, being stingy of the finegar, which, should it be very strong, it is well to dilute with soup stock, using half and half. Stir. all together well, using care not to mash the potatoes. Make a potato salad while hot, but eat it when cold. Serve with garnish of green parsley or sliced tomatoes.

Grapes For Winter Use. Pick the grapes from the stems; slip off the skins, which can be quickly done; reserve them and scald the pulp. The seeds will soon loosen and can be removed by a very fine colander or a very coarse sieve Next weigh skins and pulp, and add an equal weight of sugar; put all on together and cook slowly until very rich and somewhat stiff, then bottle and seal. This is an excellent and easy mode of preparing grapes

or winter use. To Ascertain the Hest of the Oven. A French authority on cooking gives hese rules for testing the heat of an oven: Try it with a piece of white paper. If too bot, the paper will blacken or blaze up. If it becomes a light brown, it is fit for pastry. If it turns dark yellow, it is fit for bread and the heavier kinds of cake. If ight yellow, the oven is ready for sponge cake and the lighter kinds of dessert.

Flum Roll. Make a batter of a cupful of milk and a half cupful of butter, thickened with flour snough to make a soft paste, and a tenpoonful of baking powder. Hake in three made from either fresh or canned plums, "is"-a.g., "The United States is." And with stones and skins removed. Serve warm or cold.

TODAY, YESTERDAY OR TOMORROW.

How a Conflict of Dates Is Settled. In One

Part of the Pacific Ocean. A question which has often been asked but rarely answered satisfactorily is how far one would have to go around the earth, moving east or west and supposing no time lost in transition, before one would reach the point where today changes into yesterday or tomorrow. Evidently there must be such a point somewhere, for an hour is lost every 15 degrees one goes to the east and an hour gained every 15 degrees one goes to the west.

To put the question in another way: Suppose it is one minute past midnight in Paris on the morning of Oct. I, what day is it at that same moment at the antipodes of Paris? Is it the 1st of October or the 30th of

Apparently one can prove that it is either of these days by making an instantaneous ourney half way around the earth either to the east or to the west. Going east at the moment the Paris

clocks point to a minute past midnight it is approximately 1 o'clock in the morning of Oct. 1 at Vienna, 2 o'clock of the same day at Sebastapol, 3 o'clock at Astrakhan, 4 o'clock at Bokhara, 7 o'clock at Sagion, 9 o'clock at Yokohama, 11 o'clock at Pine island and noon at Fortune island -1st of October at every point. On the other hand, going westward one

finds that it is 10 o'clock in the evening of Sept. 30 at the Azore islands, 8 o'clock in the evening at Buenos Ayres, 7 o'clock at New York, 6 o'clock at New Orleans, 3:15 at Mexico City, 1 o'clock in the afternoon near the Aleutian islands and noon at Fortune island-the date being Sept. 30 in each

Thus one has demonstrated that it is noon of Oct. 1 and noon of Sept. 30 at the same place and at the same time.

This would certainly be embarrassing to the good people of Fortune island, and in order to avoid such complications and relieve well meaning islanders in the Pacific from mixing up their Saturdays and Sundays in hopeless fashion an arbitrary line separating today from yesterday or tomorrow has been agreed upon by the navigators of civilized nations. This line has been drawn to avoid touching land. No one canbe exactly sure of the moment of passing it. but the line runs just east of the New Hebrides and the New Caledonia groups and passes near the Marion islands and the Caroline islands. Captains of vessels, judging by the positions of the islands mentioned, can fix the date within a few min-

Vessels sailing from west to east on passing this imaginary line simply repeat the day before on their logbooks, which consequently show two days bearing the same date.
