



Sanitary Officers and Police Kicked to Death by Ignorant Villagers.

Military Called Out to Save Peace Of ficers From Death - Mob Scattered by Gleaming Bayonets-Progress of the Epidemie

in Europe.

HAMBURO, Oct. 11 .- Another fatal riot occurred last night in [5t. Pauli, a suburb. of the city, growing out of the attempts of the sanitary officers to enforce the regulations for the 'prevention of the spread of cholera. As in the previous riot when a policeman was brutally kicked and stamped to death, the scene of last night's trouble inhabited entirely by the poor and ignor ant classes, who seem to have a horror of being compelled to observe cleanliness and the ordinary sanitary regulations.

When the sanitary officers attempted to put extraordinary regulations in force trouble at once resulted. The sanitary officials were accompanied by a number of policemen, but the presence of the latter had no deterrent effect upon the violence about. The mob made a descent in force upon the police, stoning them and using lubs. The police were unable to quell the rioting, in fact they could make no attempt to do no, being compelled to fight desperately to protect themselves from the fury of the rioters.

While some of the mob engaged the police others devoted themselves to a furious onslaught upon the sanitary officers. One of the latter was captured by the mob. His comrades could make no attempt to rescue him as they had all they could do to defend themselves. The of ficer in the hands of the mob was struck on the head with a large stone and knocked to the ground. Then the mob jumped on him and kicked him about the head and body until life was extinct. In the meantime the crowd had succeeded in knocking a policeman down, and he too soon met his death, the rioters with fiendish delight kicking his face until it was a pulp. Even after he was dead some of the mob danced upon his body.

The fight was waging desperately with the odds in favor of the mob when a detachment of troops, who had been hastily dispatched to the scene arrived. The officer in command of the troops ordered the mob to disperse but they paid no attheir attack upon the policemen and sani-

An order was given for the troops to fix bayonets, and when the gleaming steel blades were fastened to the muzzles of the rifles, the soldiers were ordered to charge the mob. With bayonets lowered they moved forward on the double quick, and the rioters seeing the bristling wall of steel advancing upon them attempted to disperse in short order. They ran in every direction save in the direction of the troops and disappeared in the hallways and doorways of the tumble down tenements with which the district is filled Many of them, however, were not quick enough to escape the police who began to chase them the moment they saw the crowd beginning to break up. At least a dozen of the mob were arrested. The bodies of the policeman and the sanitary officers were taken to the police station.

There Was Cholera on the Russia. QUARANTINE, Oct. 11,-All of the passengers and crew of the steamer Russia are well. The bacteriological examination in the case of the woman Aue showed the presence of comma baccilli. There is no occasion for alarm, however, as the steerage passengers of this steamer are healthy, cleanly and well nourished people, in fact better than the usual passengers of this class. This is the seventh day since the last patient was isolated from her fellowpassengers without further development.

When the Grand Trunk train arrived at Suspension Bridge last evening about 7.40 o'clock Officers Miller and Roland stepped up and arrested a rather stoutly built man, with blonde hair and moustache, clad in a light suit. The man was pointed out to the American officers by Detective Griffin, of the Ontario frontier police, and the charge against him was embezzlement. Accompanying Officer Griffin was Detective John Hodgins, of Toronto, who had shadowed his man from that city. The prisoner was accompanied by a friend, who, it is claimed, acted as a "stool pigeon" and enticed Hammond to the American side. This, however, cannot be verified. At any rate this man was very indignant at the arrest of Hammond. He was taken along, but the police let him go, and for this reason and others it is thought he was in league with the Toronto detectives to entice Hammond across the frontier. The latter was taken to police headquarters for the night.

The crime for which Hammond. gave his name as W. F. McIntyre, is wanted is the embezzling of \$6,500 belonging to George Goodrich, a wealthy and retired Boston merchant. The theft took place in 1887 when Goodrich, who travelled considerably, left the management of his estate to Hammond. The man skipped to Canada, where he has resided ever since. His record in Toronto was not good, and he has been arrested two or three times and served six months in the prison there, He is willing to return to Boston.

BEEN MARRIED BEFORE Damaging Testimony by Conductor Robi

taille-Prof. Ellis' Report Not Yet Ready-Inquest Again Ad-Journed-Hooper Goes to Montreal.

PORT HOPE, Oct. 11 .- The inquest in the now celebrated Hooper case was resumed here last evening. Hooper, who has been confined in the Cobourg jail since Friday last was present. The Crown was represented by Crown Prosecutor Cornellier, of oliette, and John W. Kerr, County Crown

Joseph Baulch produced telegrams reseived by him from Hooper, regarding the latter's wife's death. In accordance with a telegram he had received he met Hooper on Friday morning, 29th of Sept. Hooper at once proceeded to the undertaker's. He told the undertaker he was auxious to clear up rumors regarding his wife's death, and told him to go for the body to the grave. Witness did not see Hooper give the undertaker any parcels. They drove to the cemetery and Hooper gave Gravedigger Nevell orders to exhume his wife's body. He heard Hooper instruct the undertaker to have his wife's body nicely fixed as her friends might probably

Dr. Clark, of the Rockwood, Kingston asylum, sworn, said a patient named Georgina Hooper was admitted to the institution on October 14, 1891. The patient was brought to the asylum in an informal way, the certificate which admitted her being signed by J. R. Hooper and two physicians. Hooper came to the asylum and presented two irregular medi. cal certificates for the admission of his wife, and during the absence of witness this morning, from Port Hope in charge of Detectives Carpenter and McMahon.

Dr. Clark replied that the question referred to by the coroner was answered "No" in Mrs. Hooper's case. He then read a letter from Mr. Hooper, asking that he be allowed to remove his wife from the asylum and place her in charge of her relations. The doctor replied to this communication, saying he could remove her without formality at any time. Hooper took his wife from the asylum on the morning of Sept. 10, at an early hour, in order to catch the Montreal boat, Hooper was attentive to her clothes and coked more closely after her than was ustomary. He had never heard that Mrs. dooper suffered from heart disease or cancer. She enjoyed good health. The witness did not think Mrs. Hooper had any suicidal tendencies at all. in fact she would not eat at times as she feared being Her delusions had a religious Whenever Hooper came to see his wife he was very affectionate and showed her every attention.

He mentioned this to Hooper, who said he went home, taking the Joliette train, which they crossed at this point. When the third party left the train Hooper and his wife were left alone. Scathing Criticism by the American Inspector-General - Entire Southern-Atlantic Scaboard Absolutely Unprotected - Calls it Disgraceful,

Breckinridge, Inspector-General of the United States army, has made a report to the Secretary of War indicating a condition of affairs prevailing in regard to our coast defences which is officially characterized as "disgraceful" It is shown that almost the entire southern coast on the Atlantic seaboard is absolutely unprotected and at the mercy of foreign foe.
