Decrease in Exports Queensland Will Not Have a Fast Service. Loxpon, Oct. 12 -- The British Board of Trade returns show that the British exports to Canada decreased 18.52 per cent. in September and increased 3 per cent. in the nine months of 1893. The British imports from Canada decreased 6.65 per sent, for the month and 17.4 for the nine months. Canada sent less cattle, sheep, bacon, hams, butter, chiese, eggs, fish and wheat than she did last year.

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 .- It was no man's race yesterday, although the Vigilant and alkyrie tried hard to settle the international question. After alternate spells of racing, drifting and waiting for wind they gave up the contest at the expiration of

They Finish,

It was long after dark when the crack vachts abandoned the drifting match off lighland Beach and hailed their logs. They were fully seven miles from the start and they had been sailing for alx hours. The peerless white cup-defender Vigilant had turned the outer mark sever minutes ahead of the English cutter and was leading by about half a mile when the time expired. The fortunes of each had varied during the day, and the British boat had the best of it during the first part of the

The day promised well in the early morning. There was a good breeze from the north-west and the weather prophet said there would be a rattling wind outside Sandy Hook. The race was to be 15 miles to windward or leeward and return.
