The Accidental Discovery of Her Remains in a Well.

The Disappearance of a Farm Hand Causes Many to Think the Unfortunate Girl Was Murdered ---Was She Seen After

SUSPICIONS OF FOUL PLAY.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Oct. 20.—Lying in her coffin in Bishop's morgue is the body of pretty sixteen year-old Anna Augusta Orr, who disappeared from her home on the night of July 29th inst.

Part of what was one of the locality's biggest mysteries is solved by the finding of the body in a well, but the doubt as to how she met her death is a serious one when coupled with the disappearance of a hired man about the same time.

Not a few persons are of the opinion that the girl was murdered and her body thrown into the well. This supposition gains strength from the fact that if she had fallen into the well there would be bruises and abrasions on her body, which is lacking, and which it is believed would have followed a fall in this particular instance, owing to the fact that the well is only three It is on record that a per- feet in diameter, twenty-nine feet doep, and lined with masonry.

The police authorities of Fairview, Conn., at the time of her disappearance refused to assist in the search and received much adverse criticism. Anna Orr had been ill from typhoid fever before she mysteriously left her home, Castle View. During her illness robbed of her hair. Only her sister Fanny had any control over her, and on the night she disappeared her father, worn out by watching, had left her to get some

Fanny on her return found Anna partly dressed and climbing out of the window. Anna broke away from her sister and disappeared in the darkness. Mr. Orr joined in the pursuit, but nothing was seen of the girl, and the entire

neighborhood was notified Searching parties were made up and word was sent to the Bridgeport police department. Then began a search which has never been equalled in this part of the

Reports were received at first of the girl having been seen in the woods of the neighboring towns. Then there were visits to places as far away as South Carolina, only to find that the person found was not Anna Orr. The best detectives were unable to find any clue.

Ponds were drawn off and every inch of ground for miles around her home was searched. Some persons said the girl must be with friends or harbored in some farmer's family, and then the sudden departure for New York of one of Mr Orr's hired men aroused a suspicion that Anna had been murdered. On the property of Major J. B. More-

in Fairfield, Conn., about a mile from Castle View and 500 yards from any house, in a field back from the regular road which Anna most likely would have taken that night, was an uncovered well, surrounded by a curbing two feet high. While ponds and woods were searched. this well had been left untouched. Farm hands were drinking from it during the

William B. Banks, one of the farm bands, went to the well for water late yesterday afternoon. He noticed an object in the water, and, thinking it was a dog. lowered a lantern. By this light were revealed the head and garments of a woman. The first thought was that it was the body of the long missing girl. The authorities were notified and Detective George Arnold, of this city, who had worked on the case, was summoned. The body was taken from the well at

nine o'clock at night, and Detective Arnold at once recognized it as that of Anna Orr. The body was well preserved and the clothing was the same as that worn on the night of July 29. Medical Examiner Donaldson looked at

the body, after which it was taken to the morgne in this city, where Coroner Doten will begin an inquest to morrow. Mr. Orr, the girl's father, is overcome with grief. Mrs. Orr has been a sufferer for some time from mental aberration. Coroner Doten has decided to make a thorough investigation. How the girl could have jumped down that well and

not received so much as a scratch is a mystery which the coroner thinks should It is understood that persons in Fairfield will testify to having seen Anna Orr sitting on the steps of a school not far from the well several days after she disappeared. The coroner wants to know the whereabouts of the hired man who disappeared.

SOCIALIST GAINS.

Great Increase of Socialism in Germany Shown by Recent Elections. BERLIN, Oct. 20 .- The Vorwaerts, the organ of the Social Democrats, yesterday published the report that will be submitted to the annual Social Congress that will be beld in Cologue next week. Much of the report is devoted to the recent elections for members of the Reichstage in which the Socialists made very heavy gains. The report admits, however, that it will be impossible to maintain the rapid progress of socialism, as shown at the polls in the late elections, since the forces of resistance must increase. Nevertheless, the report continues, the increase of nearly 350,000 Socialist votes since 1890 is a most substantial gain, and, the aggregate Socialists polling 1,800,000, the party distances by more than 500,000 votes the polling strength of any other party.

Returns are quoted to show the firm footbold the party has established in many. agricultural and ultra-Conservative dis-The revenue for the year is placed in excess of the receipts of 1892. The expenses, however, have amounted to 316,667 marks, owing to the electoral campaign. The excess of expenditures will be met out of the reserve funds.

The expenses above stated are exclusive of the expenditures of the local committees, which were defrayed by voluntary donations. The report contends that owing to the enthusiasm and self-abnegation of the adherents of Socialism the party does not spend in elections a quarter as much money as is expended by other parties.

Grand Trunk Receipts. LONDON, Oct. 20,-The Grand Trunk Ry, report shows a small increase in the half-year's earnings so far stand \$16,000. The ratio of working expenses to earnings shows a decrease from 72.66 to 72.52. The net receipts were \$519,000, as compared to \$512,000 for the first six months of 1892. The amounts received from interest show considerable diminution, so that the net revenue receipts \$549,000, as against \$547. 000 last year. After deducting pre-preferred charges \$497,000 then remains. The balance, \$51,900, is available for distribution, adding a very small amount to that carried over the previous haif-year. This is just enough to guarantee the payment of 1 per cent. on gnaranteed stock. The wintry weather and low rates caused the receipts to suffer.

AN AUSTRIAN CRISIS.

Government Certain of Defeat-Failed to Patch Up a Majority. VIENNA, Oct. 20 .- A ministerial crisis are irritated over the Franchise bill intro duced in the lower house of the Reichs rath by Count Tasffe, Minister of the Interior. The bill provides that the right to vote shall be extended to all who have attained their 24th year, have accomplished their military obligations, and have lived in one place for at least six months. Illiterate persons will only be permitted to vote when paying direct taxes and when they shall have served

Persons of this class will, however, be allowed to vote when in the employment of the state. It was said at the time the bill was in troduced that the government's only object was to allay the agitation of the Socialists in favor of universal suffrage. It was known that the Conservatives would oppose the measure, but the government hope to patch up a majority out of the other elements composing the Reichsrath. In this it appears to have failed,

and it is evident now that the bill is probably doomed. The bill introduced by the government a few days ago to sanction the action of the ministry in declaring Prague and other places in Boltemia to be in a state of siege, will also fail of a majority, and the government will therefore be beaten in this direction also. Count Taaffe and Count Kalnoky were with the Emperor again last evening. The situation is

critical.
