The Ropeway System.

One of the most interesting instances of railroading according to the ropeway system is now in operation at the plant of the Bimetallic Mining company at Granite Mon., the total length being 9,750 feet and the difference in elevation between the terminals some 1,235. The descending loads weigh about II tons and develop enough power to haul back the empty buckets and about 50 tons of supplies daily, as well as run the ore crusher and elevator. The line can in fact handle some 250 tons every 10 hours at a cost of about 5 cents per top

The steepest line of this kind, however, is said to be that at the Holy Moses mine at Creede, Colo. It has a fall of 1,000 feet In 2,000 feet and leads out from the loading terminal at the mine on an inclination of 31 degrees. An unusual line of this description is said to be in operation at Aslaund. Norway, consisting of two steel ropes 134 inches in diameter, running at an angle of 45 degrees from the top of a steep cliff to he bottom in a clear span of 2,350 feet. One car travels upon each rope, the traction rope passing over pulleys on the cliff, in this way the loaded car in descending hanling up the empty ear. - New York Sun.


