



PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 15. - The enth annual session of the Genera ssembly, Knights of Labor began yester day morning in Industrial hall. In order to expedite business, the Assembly decided that all resolutions must aubmitted by or before noon on Thursday. Mr. Powderly then read his annual

After referring to the work done by the order, Mr. Powderly replied to the attacks made upon him by Protestant clergymen, who charged that he was conspiring with the Roman Catholic Church to overthrow

He said :- "There is but one conclusion arrive at. No sensible Protestant has ad anything to do with these matters. No self-respecting man could descend to such depths of slander and villainous misrepresentation." The mints are now in readiness and await only the explicit orders to begin. When these will be given Secretary Carliesle does not care to eay. FIFTY MILLION. The Revenue Uncle Sam Expects Under

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15 - A revenue of \$50,000,000 is expected by the Democrats Swedish Explorers Meet Death in the of the Ways and Means Committee from the moderate income (ax which they propose to incorporate in the new revenue bill. The rate of the tax will probably be two per cent, and the exemption will be high enough to exclude the great mass of laboring men and people on small salaries. The limit now under discussion is from \$3,500 to \$4,000. If the income tax is adopted in the form now under consideration other changes in the internal revenue laws will not be necessary. There will be no increase in the beer tax, the whisky tax, the tax on manufactured tobacco or the tax on eigers. The question of duty on sugar is still an open one, but it is not unlikely that a duty will be imposed of about one cent, per pound on both raw and refined sugars. The treatment of bituminous coal is an open question with the Democrats of the committee. Coal was on the free list in the original draft of the tariff bill in accordance with the pledge of the Democratic national platform to modify the McKinley law in the direction of free raw materials. The protest from the coal districts of West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Alabama has been so strong, however, that some of the members are weakening and may vote to retain a small duty. Chairman Wilson hopes to present the completed bill to the Repub-lican members of the Ways and Means committee by the latter part of next week so that they can have their report ready upon the meeting of Congress in De-
