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CRIMINAL STATISTICS. EXTRACTS FROM THE REPORT ON KINGSTON PENITENTIARY.

There was one Suicide and one Death—The Cost of the Various Departments—Asking to Introduce Newspapers and Stained Windows.

There was one suicide in the Kingston penitentiary during the year ended June 30th; eighteen convicts were pardoned, 140 finished their sentences, and three were sent to the lunatic asylum during the year.

The expenditure for the year was \$125,144, or \$248.00 per convict. The revenue was \$6,150, or \$60.00 per convict, leaving the net cost of each convict \$248.00, or 96 cents per day.

The details of expenditure were: Salaries, \$54,554.24; gratuities, George McLaughlin, \$25.00; John Kelly, \$1,650.54; officers' uniforms, \$2,887.83; ratios, \$22,294.28; convicts' clothing, \$3,376.94; convicts' travelling allowances, \$1,851.38; convicts' supplies, \$1,841.50; bedding, \$1,721.72; instruments, \$14; chapel, \$161.78; library, \$273.54; escapes, \$1,860.00; officers' mess, \$1,028.64; light, \$2,569.02; heating, \$12,053.10; maintenance of machinery, \$1,589.28; armory, \$48; stationery, \$1,471.30; farm, \$897.01; maintenance of buildings, \$4,891.81; repairs to buildings, \$5,041.90; hospital, \$1,040.90; convicts' washings, \$710.92; kitchen, \$1,075.72; new drying closet, \$1,500; miscellaneous, \$676.00.

The value of labor and day's work done during the year was \$59,831. The value of work done in the female department is placed at \$1,876. There are now two life prisoners in Kingston penitentiary, three of whom were twenty or in fourteen years, forty-four for ten years and thirty-two for one year.

The warden, in his report, speaks of the conduct and industry of the convicts in favorable terms. He says there have been fewer visits and punishments than any previous year. The clothing industry is one of the very best manufacturing industries.
