Hawley, a nessenger in the employ of the Canadian Express Company, was shot and instantly illed shortly after the 7.35 train for Hamiton left the Union station yesterday lawley and his mate, James McCausland. who lives in Hamilton, had just set their car to rights. They opened their boxes and took out their belts and pouches and fastened them around their waists. Hawley bent over to get his revolver. His back was turned to McCausland, who was startled by a sharp report and turning quickly saw his fellow-worker falling to the floor with a stream of blood gushing from his mouth and nostrils.
