The late Duke of Leinster, whose death was chronicled only the other day, was a ed freland to help King Morrogn in the beginning of the eleventh century. The Geraldines came originally from Florence, where the Italian family name was Gherwith Edward, the Confessor.

Gerald Fitzgerald, fifth Duke of Leinster was the premier Duke, Marquis and Earl of Ireland. He was born Angust 16, 1851, and succeeded his father February 10, 887.
