currence in 1880. The plea of insanity was set up at the trial, but Holzhay was convicted and sentenced to life-imprisonment. During his confinement he read a good many works of metaphysics, and finally wrote a long statemeat of his own mental condition, which he requested should not be made public during his life unless he became hopelessly in-

Now that Holzhay has been taken to the Ionia asylum, his stor, is published and occupies four columns of the Detroit News. Here is the substance of it: "It is now more than five years since the symptoms of the disorder that brought about my fall manifested themselves. I paid little attention to them, for the decay of physical and mental power was so gradual as not to arouse. apprehension, mistaking it for a temporary disorder. But when in time it grewsteadily worse I became alarmed and sought medical advice, but without relief.

"Through lack of nutrition by indigestion, my nervous system had become so



healthful sleep, for the heavy eyed wake fulness that took its place was but a continual nightmare. Add to the effects of bad health and the torments of insomnia a well developed case of melancholis inherited from the father's side, and which had lain latent in me till now. Only this much I remember, that where before I had all my thoughts centered on getting well, I was now entirely ruled by the impulse of committing desperate deads-less to injure anybody than to place myself in situations where I had to expect to be shot down any

"I am convinced now that these desperate criminal outbreaks were instinctive efforts of the mind to break away from narrow, self centered thoughts. The realization of imminent peril would naturally tend to force thought into new channels, giving case and relief under circumstances which could hardly have been regarded as comfortable by any sane man. 
