

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

We paid, for example, \$100,000 to Toronto University, being part of the \$160,000 unanimously voted to it by the House to assist in restoring the building, which was partially destroyed by fire. Our receipts for the year from liquor li-cense fees amounted to \$208,184. Our estimate was \$3,0,000. The number of licenses less than that issued during the previous year, and in all probability there will be a somewhat greater reduction during the current year. The province took to itself con-trol of liquor licenses in 1876. Since that date it has received as net revenue from licenses \$2,630,515, or \$164,407 per year. has paid to the municipalities during the same period \$3 885,922, or \$242,870 per year. Nova Scotia urgently asks the Dominion to relieve her of liabilities to the amount of a million and a baif of dollars. New Brunswick, with a population of only 321,294 had at the close of last year a bonded debt of \$2,342,000. And where, sir, we may well ask is this to end! With an aggregate population of only 888,905, or two-fiftes that of Ontario alone, maintain separate Lagridatures, each of them having a second cham ber, and that because of this the adminis trative work is trebled and the expenditures on education, administration of justice and public works is very much larger than would otherwise be necessary. At the same time, we may well, pay we must insist, that any settlement of these difficulties, as concerns the future, I do not speak of existing obligations, whether by means of increased annual grants to each of the provinces, having serict regard to population, or otherwise should be a comprehensive settlement arrived at after a careful study of the whole situation, altered as it is in so many regards since Confederation, that should be an absolutely final settle-
