A letter was read from Sargt. Major Morgans, of the Royal military college, stating that the children who attended the public schools of non commissioned officers and men at the college, in former years, were taxed twenty-five cents per month, but this has been increased to fifty cents. The children of "A" battery and officers are admitted free, and several of them residing outside of the city. The writer asked if the college children could not be granted the same privileges as those of the battery. In relation to this matter a letter was read from the minister of education. He says there is nothing in the public school act or regulations entitling children of parents, connected with the Royal military college, to have any privileges not granted to others.
