



DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

EXPORT DUTY ON LOGS NOT TO BE REIMPOSED.

After Debating Mr. Ivor's Motion for Six Hours the Member for Sherbrooke Withdraws It. Hon. William Macdonald goes to the Standing Committee.

OTTAWA, April 12.—Yesterday was his last day in the House, and although there was no bill calling for that, it was mostly about logs.

The meeting for Sherbrooke, Mr. Ivor, began at 10 a.m., and a long-standing resolution that the export duty should be imposed by savings and expenses paid out from 4 miles west of Ottawa, was introduced by the member for the northern division of the Government.

At first Mr. Foster announced that although he sympathized with it, the Government could not change its policy, and Mr. Ivor then withdrew his motion.

OTTAWA, April 12.—An Act to amend the Island Revenue Act, of which Mr. Gosselin gives notice, provides for the extension to the Northwest Territories of the Island Revenue Act in consequence of the increase of two dollars in the amount of income tax for the Island Revenue law on May 1.

It also provides that bottlers shall place all bottles and flask labels plainly showing the name of the place also that cigar shall be marked with a stamp from a factory in less quantities than 100.
