DETROIT, April 19. -Secretary Wilkins of the central division of the Amateur Athletic Union has sent letters to the other representatives of the division suggesting that a meeting of the directors he held at Detroit April 27 to adopt some measures which it is desirous to place before the meeting of the union at New York on the 30th inst. The most important of these measures, and in fact the only one of general interest, is a proposition to admit Canada to the athletic union. Secretary Wilkins is ardently in favor of bringing Canada into the union. If the central division recommends its ad mission the delegates can- go before the New York meeting with fair prospects of getting the proposition adopted. The adoption of the proposition would undoubtedly make Ontario a section of the central division and bring Toronto amateurs into the same field with the amateur clubs of Detroit. This, it is thought by many, would have the effect of keeping the Irish party together, as they would then have somehing tangible to concentrate their pat-riotism upon. Whether or not Mr. Giadstone will accede to the appeal for a manifesto in order to check the stampede among the Irish supporters of his party cannot as yet be conjectured. T. P. O'Connor denies that there is any

trouble in the ranks or any serious divisions, but he admits that differences of opinion are developing which it would be well to harmonize if possible. He looks to the elections to heaf these minor dissensions. If Mr. Gladstone's Home Rule program is satisfactory to Ireland, he says all the Irish members will unite in assisting the Liberals to put it through. The Par-nellites will not lag behind in this work. if, on the other hand, the bill is not what the people of Ireland demand, the members will unite in causing its rejection. Mr. O'Connor does not think Gladstone will publish his scheme before the elections, but these cannot be delayed much beyond July.

Frightful Explosion at a Glycerine Fac tory Near Newark, N.J .- The Superintendent and Many Employer Slain. NEWARK, N.J., April 19. - Hector De castro & Co.'s powder unils, near the land ng station of Lake Hopakong, blew up at 3.30 this afternoon. Ten men were killed, among them Superintendent Smith, who was in charge of the buildings and works.
