## ACROSS THE ATLANTIC.

**WOMAN'S SUFFRAGIST BILL DEFEATED IN THE COMMONS.**

Dynasties News From Various Countries

Cities—A Passenger Thrilled to Death On an English Railway—The Duke in Art-General Foreign News.

LONDON, April 29.—In the House of Commons yesterday Sir Albert Kaye Rollit moved the second reading of his Woman's Suffrage bill, which Mr. Balfour favored. A division was taken, in which 100 members of the majority against the measure voted for it, as many had expected that it would be rejected by a vote of two to one.

Mr. Samuel Smith, Liberal, member for Flintshire, moved the rejection of the people.

Mr. Bulwer said he did not agree with those who held that it would be degrading for women to take part in politics. He himself, at meetings of the Princess League had urged women to take a share in politics. Every section of the House was only too anxious to show its support of the measure. It did not in any of their mouths to say that taking an active part in framing the policy of the Empire would be degrading to women.

## STILL ANOTHER

A Passenger Dying, After Being Injured and Robbed in a Compartment.

LONDON, April 29.—John Ackroyd, an insurance collector, was throttled and nearly strangled in a railway carriage on the Great Northern last evening, and he is dying at the Bradford Hospital in consequence of his injuries.

Mr. Ackroyd left Halifax for Bradford in a second-class compartment of the night express. He had considerable money with him, and carried valuable papers in his pocket.

Two well-dressed men entered his compartment just as the train started. They had no hand luggage, the guard says. Their tickets were for Bradford, as was Mr. Ackroyd.

When the guard opened the door Bradford the two men were gone. Mr. Ackroyd lay unconscious on the floor, his clothes torn and blood flowing from his mouth. His pockets had been rifled, and his money was gone.

At first he recovered slightly and said that just after leaving Halifax he took out a cigar and asked his mate for a match. As he put his hand in his pocket to get his match-box, the other man pinched his arm and threw him to the floor, where he was struck on the head and being choked. The next he knew he was in hospital.

No arrests have been made and it has not been learned how and where the two men left the train.

## YET AT WORK

The Anarchist Horror Scaring People Out of Their Seats.

NEW YORK, April 29.—It would be entirely useless to attempt to deny that the situation in the very heart of France is fraught with danger. The outrage which occurred yesterday proves that the Anarchists are thoroughly organized and are still active in their efforts to bring about revolution.

Certainly these latest events give grounds for expecting trouble on May-day, and those who hitherto were undismayed are now becoming frightened. Many foreigners are leaving the city, and in many first-class hotels like the Chateau, the Westminster, and the Hotel du Rhin several desperadoes have been received calling orders for apartments.

M. Denech, the Commissary of Police, who arrested Ravachol, yesterday received an anonymous letter assuring him that, no matter what course of action he might take, M. Dreher and Prosecutor General Quassay would be blown up before May 1.

Of course it is possible that the jurors who rendered the verdict of guilty in the case of Ravachol's lawyer, who rendered it as "not guilty," will not believe that it was the intent of the public order it would "wring not a drop of fresh blood" from the prisoners to death. A law of capital punishment may also have influenced them in coming to a verdict. There is also, however, another explanation of their indecision.

I had a conversation this morning with one of the jurors, a wealthy, middle-aged merchant, and he told me that he and his colleagues had not given their attention to Ravachol's former crimes against the community, but to the dynamics outrages per se. He said that he had no objection to the picture of "The World's Desire" which was seen, while on exhibition at 391 Strand, W.C., and was complained of by him as indecent.

It represents a beautiful young woman standing nude, while she attracts to herself a number of male warriors, who are holding her sword, and the like. In the foreground a dark-robed monk seeks to restrain with uplifted crucifix the unstable youth who would rush forward toward the nude divinity.

Rev. Dr. Kallio, of Gorlitz, has agreed to accept a position as translator of the scripture into the Hindoo language, and will command the second whaleback in the Gladstone line.
