

Bow to Make Butter for Suit

OTTAWA, May 5 .- At a meeting of the Prof. Robertson, dairy commissioner, continued his evidence. During his examoration he said that the second shipment of bulter from Woodstock creamery to England wold at 124 shillings per 112 lbs. or 26 cents per lb Deducting commissions, freight, cost of production, etc., this gave the farmer a little over 20 cents per lb. de livered at the railway station at Ingersoli. Butter shipped from Australia sold in England at one shilling per pound. He then turned to the result of experiments at experimental farm in dairying, feedshipment of butter, namely, the lack of rosy flavor to be found in English butter. They ascertained that the cure was to mix the milk from one treably-calved cow with that of several other cows. By this means the flavor desired was obtained. City milkmen, he said, were losing in the quantities of milk obtained by feeding 16 pounds per day when they would get a larger supply by feeding 5 to 8 pounds. Over-feeding feranged the digestive organs and prerented an increase in beef as well as milk

Quis waded into the pond and dragged the body out. The body was lying on its left side, and the right shoulder was not wet. The pond is not more than a couple of feet deep. The body was then removed to Roull's morgue in Newton, on the corner of Lexington and Grand streets. The autopsy was then performed by Dr. A. C. Combs, assisted by Dr. V. E. Judson. It was found on examination that there were two gashes on the throat extending from the left to the right side. The woman was about 30 years old and well dressed. She had on a slate-colored traveling dress and on her shoulders was a black lace cape. A new spring bonnet, gayly decked with flowers, was on her head. On the ring finger of the left hand were two gold rings, and in her ears were a pair of diamond earers in Canal-street, a thoroughfare known rings. Sorceress of the Reserve. SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., May 5 .- For some time past a story has been told that an Indian named John Jacobs of Garden River was bewitched and that he was suffering torments from the malevolent influence of a woman (a squaw) who is believed to be a sorceress.

Peter Degoche, father in law of the afflicted Jacobs, and Theophile Boissoneau, both Indians, say that Jacobs married his daughter about the first of the year, and ever since that time he has been laid up with an unknown illness and, at times, goes mad. His son-in-law, he said, was under the influence, since January of a witch who is on the reserve, and they ascribe, his discase and mad ravings to her influence.

It seems that the sorceress wanted Jacobs to marry her daughter, and for not doing so and, instead, marrying another, he has been stricken down by disease; at times he gets mad and lately the most extraordinary manifestations of the power of the sorceress have been displayed, when they have picked pebblestones, needles and teeth out of his eyes.
