

Edward Ystes' London Letter. NEW YORK, May 10.—The queen does not intend to visit Buckingham palace this season. Her majesty will proceed to Balmoral toward the sad of next week, ebber May 19th or May 20th, returning to Windsor castle on June 23th. The queen has brought home from Costebelle a large collection of water color sketches, by Signor Carelli, a well known Italian artist at Hyeres, which are to be taken to Balmoral to be hung in one of her majesty's sittles

I hear that the non-arrival of the emper at Darmstadt caused much annoyance to the royal party there and that the queen and Empress Frederick were particularly vexed as they were exceedingly anxious to have a consultation with his majesty respecting certain private affairs and that it was partly in order to facilitate the early settlement of these matters that the queen went to great fatigue and expense of the long journey from the Riviera to Darmstade. It seems that the emperor decided that it would be inconsistent with his dig nity if he went to Darmstadt just now with out a state reception and elaborate military functions.
