Herrington, Napanee, counsel for defendant, said it was urged, on behalf of the plaintiff, that the defendant had made the notes in question and had received the benefit of the goods furnished as the consideration for them, and that the plea now 'set up that she, being a married woman at the time with no separate estate, and therefore not capacitated to make a contract was a defence she was entitled to make, but one that did not reflect much credit upon her honesty or good faith. She, by her efforts to do that which she now pleads she could not do, has defranded the nominal plaintiff, Miss Coffey, out of some \$300, and that if the court held the plaintiff was not entitled to judgment for the amount of the notes the defendant, through her had faith, had disentitled horself to any consideration from this court and should recover no costs against the plaintiff.
