

The synod session on Thursday afternoon pened at three o'clock. Rev. Rural Dean Bliss discussed his notice of motion, that rural deans address public meetings on missions with a view to increasing local contributions to clerical stipends; that the classification committee re-classify the missions to as to make stipends of missionary pricate \$800 per year; and that during the occupancy of any mission by a deaces, the elerical secretary pay him such proportion of the grant as will make his stipend from all sources \$600 per annum. The rural dean eaid that if the propositions embraced in his motion were carried out it would be easy for missonaries to exist.
