EXCLUDED THE PRESS

AND AN ALDERMAN RETIRED FROM THE MEETING

The Exemption Question was Considered to Private-The Mayor not Ansible to Have Alderman Back Hiring Reward ad-Ald. Polson Indignant

The action of the finance committee in excluding reward from their meeting last evening at which the exemption question was discussed, is condemned on all sides. The people are not in favor of star chamber sessions of the municipal representatives, and demand to know what particular reason had induced Ald. Polson, by Major McAlister, suggested that the Ward reporter leave the room. Ald. Polson also favored doing business in secret and voted for the retirement of the reporter. The Ward reporter dropped in and he was notified as to procedure regarding reporters. Ald. Polson and Livingston were not present when the exclusion of the reporters was decided. Ald. Livingston said he did not wish one paper to be represented and the other ignored. Ald. Polson said he wanted meetings of aldermen to discuss municipal matters given to the fallen politicians, and if the Ward reporter did not want to be there he was welcome to remain in the room. As this was not the intention of the committee, on this occasion, he would not remain and went home.
