

FURTHER CONTRIBUTION TO ST. JOHN SUFFERERS The Bominion Government and the Canal Tells. The Intercolonial Railway of Lost Pays Expenses Several Persons Killed My Lightning.

Offawa, July 13. - An order in council has been passed amending the order in coqueil of April 4 last with reference to rebate on canal tolls on grain from Lake Ontario ports, passing through the St. Lawrence Canals for export from Montreal. The order as passed allowed relate only on shipmenta from "Canadian" Lake Onlario ports. The new order simply strikes out "Canadian," so that wheat or coarse grains shipped from American ports on Lake Ontario passing through St. Lawrence canals and exported from Moutreal get the advantage of the rebate. This has no bearing on the transshipment at Odgensburg of western wheat, which still remains liable to full tolls.

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
