THE RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

The Bay of Quinte railway company will,
in its own as well as the public interest, see
that the coroner's inquest, which must
be held touching the accident near Brant-
ville, is made as exhaustive as possible.There is no reason to conclude that gross
negligence has prevailed; it is not war-
anted on any account and cannot be
attributed by any company or corporation whichis governed in its operations by sound busi-
ness principles. But the information to handdoes not satisfy the people that the precautions
against mishap have been as exacting as the circumstances demanded. The factswill be elicited by the official enquiry. In
this connection it will be made quite apparent what the routine is re-
garding the running of trains; what the orders of the dispatcher were

on the fatal morning; whether they were followed by those to whom they were committed. A

tremendous responsibility rests upon the man who manipulates the trains upon a single track as one manipulates the buttons upon a check board. The exigencies of business sometimes suggest close connexions, but, as a rule, the dispatcher's heart is clear and it is not his fault if his calculations misfire. Nor may it be the fault of any one else if misfortunes occur.

The best laid schemes of the most thoughtful men gang

at's, and all too startlingly crash

comes. The accident on the Bay of Quinte is in the nature of the unexpected, but pub-
lic policy requires that all the details shouldbe known and that the enquiry into the
cause of the disaster shall be as searching as

possible.

QUESTIONS FOR THE CLERGY.

A list of questions have been submitted

by the royal commission on prohibition to

the clergy of Canada. These questions will

draw out not so much the opinions of the

ministers of religion as their knowledge on

points on which they may be supposed to

be authorities from their particular oppor-

tunities of observation. The questions are:

1. From your experience and observation

as a clergymen, do you consider the use of

alcoholic liquors any shade as hurtful

morally and socially?

2. What from such experience and obser-

vation is your opinion of the effects of the

use, in any degree, of intoxicating liquors on

the family and domestic relations, and on

the care, education and prospects of chil-

dren?

3. From such experience and observation,

do you believe that in families where intox-

icating Liquors are used in moderation the

effect is detrimental to the social and moral

habits, the domestic relations and the edu-

cation and prospects of children?

4. Has a prohibitory law been at any

time in operation in a parish, mission or

other charge in which you have been sta-

ted?

5. Was such law the Scott act, the Dan-
kirk act, or the similar option law?

6. From your experience and observation

had such prohibitory law the effect—(a) of

increasing or lessening the drinking of in-

toxicating liquors (1) in the family, (2) in

the community?
