after Parliament resumed business. Mr. Gladstone's three new Cabinet Minisiers, Messra Asquith, Arnold Morley and Acland, are sound Liberals. Mr. Asquith alone is slightly tainted with Radicalism, but he has a legal mind, with such a strong bias towards his high office as makes him malleable on principles. Arnold Morley is in everything Gladstonian. Mr. Acland has potent old Whig family connections and is heir to large estates.

Fortunate ministerialists explain that th name of Labouchers was on the list which Mr. Gladstone presented to the Queen, bu that Her Majesty being irreconcilable Mr ladstone was forced to omit the name. Mr. Labouchere's friends refuse to cred this statement, and point to the omission of other Radicals as proving the hollowness of the excuse. The open truth is that Mr. Pladstone detests Mr. Labouchere, and the latter heartily reciprocates.

Nothing in Mr. Labouchere's politics life is likely to cause him so much rejoicin as leading a schism destroying the tilad stone Government. He will have ample apportunity for this in the coming session when the irate Radicals refuse to gratify Mr. Gladstone's passion for Home Rule be ore everything.

Baron Houghton has been from early life protege of Mr. Gladstone. He has pubished a volume of verses. He now has ample means to fulfil the traditional hospitalities of the viceregal office, his estate in Yorkshire having in recent years returned aim a large income from newly-discovered toal and tron mines.

Instead of the appointment being, as it cossiped in clubs, due to Mr. Gladstone's desire to give his protege a post worth £200,000 yearly, Baron Houghton is able and is likely to spend much beyond his whole official income in lavish entertain-

Robert Offley Ashburton Milnes, second Baron Houghton, was born in 1858, was educated at Harrow and at Trinity College, Cambridge. He was a Lord in Waiting to Her Majesty in 1886. In 1880 he married Sibyl Marcia, who died in 1887, daughter of Sir Frederick Ulric Graham, Bart., by whom he has one son and three daughters. His country seat is Fryston Hall, Ferry Bridge, Yorkshire.

Ripon and Rosebery. London, Aug. 18. - The Marquis Ripon's selection as Colonial Secretary meets with a fair amount of approval in Liberal colonial circles, Lord Ripon, though much criticised during his previous tenure of office, has always shown himself a strong man, and fully in accord with the Liberal movements of the time. He is some times described as the most Radical mem ser of the House of Lords.

The Earl of Rosebery's presence in the Cabinet is of great colonial importance. since it secures in the Ministry a powerful champion of the best Federation ideas. This is the more important as it is now stated that the special committee appointed sy the Federation League to consider and submit definite practical proposals will recommend to the council in the autumn to ask the Premier to convene a colonial conference for the definite discussion of a joint scheme of Imperial defence.
