ORE SEVERE EXAMS.

Education Minister's Proposals.-The Tests Will Be Made Stiffer. The minister of education is considering the propriety of raising the standard of the high school entrance examination to that prescribed to the public school leaving examinations, and, with the view of so doing, has addressed a circular to the school inspectors of the province. The minister says it has been represented to him that such a step would prove of advantage to both high and public schools, by doing away with the present overlapping of the courses of study, and by thus making the work of the second ary schools to begin in all cases where that

of the elementary mobools end. It is held that the present standard has the effect of doing away with the fifth form work in many rural schools and compelling children to attend a high school, where their parents only wish them to acquire attainments of the public school course beyond the limits of the fourth form. It is moreover contended that in cities, towns and villages, what is now taken up in the high schools during the first year might be taken up in the public schools.

The pupils who pass the entrance examinations are said in many instances to be too immature in age and attainments to take up the full course required by the high school primary and matriculation examinations, and would be bonefited by a longer drill in purely public school subject

If the proposed change is made it is not atended to have it so carried out as to render necessary any change in the staff of any high or public school. From the large number of candidates who write every year at the entrance examination he is jestified in assuming that pupils would readily prepare for a higher standard if the present course is advanced. If the higher standard is adopted it will not come into force until 1894, and care will be taken not to have the test too severe at the first examinations.

The extraordinary number of students presenting themselves for junior leaving as well as entrance examinations will necessitate more difficult papers being submitted to
