FEAR OF CHOLERA. The cablegrams give information touching our federal, provincial and divic authorities to prompt and decisive action. The mistake committed by the people of Hamburg was in concealing facts which should have been made known, and as widely as possible, since, in their ignorance, the people rushed time to the disease. There are conflicting accounts as to the status of the cholera in Paris and Antwerp. 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
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
