The Globe says that the Ontario farmer,  
living in a tree country, with a fertile soil  
and good climate, enjoying the advantage  
of railway communication, and using the  
best agricultural implements he can procure,  
thinks it has a right to expect that his hard  
work shall be rewarded by something more  
than mere immunity from starvation, and  
as a rule he is not at all satisfied with the  
pecuniary results of his business. It is  
nearly certain that if a plebiscite of the  
farmers of Canada could be taken upon the  
question of the tariff, free from all considera-  
tions, four-fifths of them would vote the N. P. to  
be a costly and dismal fraud.

A CHANGE NEEDED.

Agitation has been renewed against the  
centralization of law business in Toronto.  
It is well. The public are paying heavily to  
keep a lot of practitioers in Toronto, and by judicious work the legislature can be  
compelled to make changes. We agree with  
any exchange when it remains: "The law  
should be taken to the people at a centre in  
each county. That is the plan adopted in  
many of the states of the neighboring repub-  
lics, and the Canadian government should  
make a similar effort." All the difficulties  
of a rural life are not satisfactorily met by  
the present system of law business. The
