JUSTEP PUNISHED. The U.S. Object to Strict Quarantine, in Central America

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 30,-The embarge placed upon American commerce by the action of some Central American countries in closing their ports to ships from the United States is a matter of deep concern to the State Department. Aside from the actual loss to our merchants resulting this action the interruption to the mails is a source of vexa-An unreasoning dread of the introduction of cholera has led to the issue of these troublesome decrees by the governments of the south. That which at New York was a rigorous but still limited quarantine has been exaggerated by our Central American neighbors into an abso-

lute termination of intercourse with the U.S., and is regarded in official circles here as an unwarrantable exercise of authority. The Department of State is not disposed to act arrogantly toward our smaller southern neighbors in the matter, but is disposed to adopt methods based on reason to secure its object. The United States steamer Concord, which arrived at Colon yesterday, was not ordered there with the purpose of compelling the local authori-

tion to admit to that port the Pacific Mail steamship Columbia, which now lies off the entrance. The Concord's movement is to convey the Consul-General of the United States and the commissioners from the local government of Panama to Carthagena, where the President of Colombia resides, and endeavor to arrange with him some terms of settlement of the quarantine question.
