

It is understood that the whole of the personalty and the duke's property in America are bequeathed to his widow. Heirlooms of various kinds at Trentham, Donrobin and Stafford house are of great value. The late duke sold a number of pic tures and miniatures, which were not in entail, some of the best of which were bought by the Duc d'Aumale, and are now at Chantilly. The Dukes of Sutherland are hereditary directors of the London and North-western railway, and if the head of the family does not care to join the board himself he has a right to nominate a director of fhe company. The late duke was a director more than forty years having been nominated by his father in 1852. In 1826 the first Duke of Sutherland, then Marquis of Stafford, subscribed £100,000 toward the construction of the Liverpool, and Manchester railway, which was then regarded as a most chimerical undertaking.
